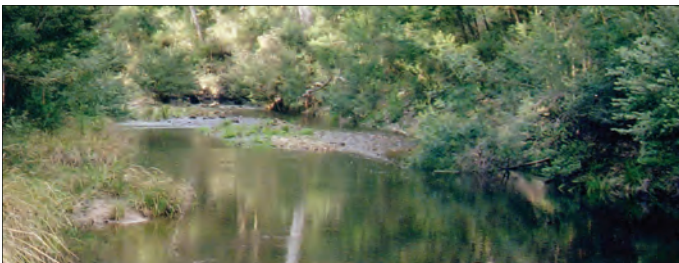
Shells and Seashore Life of East Gippsland March 29– April 2

Feathers, Frogs & Furry Things



Easter this year, we will forget the Easter Bunny or even the Bilby and spend Easter in the forests of the Snowy River National Park getting to know the local wildlife.

This ecotour is gathering data on wildlife populations as part of a research project and this year for the first time, the survey will be carried out during autumn. On previous trips over 25 new species have been added to the Atlas of Victorian Wildlife for this site

So enjoy a very natural Easter break this year in a quiet forest location away from the bustle. Your naturalist guides will share with you their knowledge of wildlife seldom seen by casual visitors.

The three days includes a busy program of setting up special traps, checking them and recording data on wildlife that have been captured. We will make a lists of birds of the area and enjoy short walks to listen and look for signs of wildlife.

After the sun sets the bush comes alive and we prepare for evening walks to listen and look for nocturnal animals. What might we hear? The soft yap of a sugar glider, frogs calling from a dam or perhaps the haunting sound of an owl? Maybe we'll see a glimpse of a wombat or wallaby blundering across the track.

Nature Notes

During a spring tour to Croajingolong, we were enjoying the views from the balcony of the Pt Hicks lighthouse, when someone observed what appeared to be a snake on the road below. A closer look with binoculars showed that it was in fact two large Red-bellied Black Snakes intertwined in a tight coil wrestling quite vigorously along the road (See the picture below). We wondered at the time whether we were observing fighting or mating behaviour? The following information from “Australian Snakes” by Rick Shine confirms that the snakes we observed were in fact fighting males, not a mating pair.



If a male encounters another male close to a female, he either fights or runs away (apparently depending on whether or not he is larger than the other male). If two similarly sized, large males encounter each other in this way, the resulting “combat dance is one of the most spectacular sights in the Australian bush. The rival males engage in a test of strength, wrapping around each other’s bodies so that they look like a plaited whip. Each male attempts to place his head over that of his rival and force the other’s head down. If one snake is much larger or stronger than the other, the fight may last only a few seconds. On the other hand, combats between two very large males can last for hours. Generally males do not bite each other during these encounters.

Most untrained observers who see male combat in snakes interpret it as courtship or mating, rather than fighting. The two combatants are coiled around each other, move together very elegantly and do not bite. However the plaited appearance of fighting males is very different to the positions that snakes use for courtship and mating. In these latter activities the female generally remains passive while the male moves around in a jerky excited fashion. Females that want to avoid mating seem to escape fairly easily. After all, the male does not have any arms or hand with which to hold her down!

We were very lucky to experience this behaviour and see it all from a wonderful elevated vantage point.

Remote cameras for wildlife surveys

Advances in technology bring new devices into our lives all the time, mobile phones gets smaller, there are so many new gadgets with buttons and programs, some are exciting while some just plain frustrating! In the world of wildlife survey, one of the great advances has been in remote cameras. These have earned a significant place in wildlife researchers kits.

Tempting bait is set in a wire “cage” luring animals to the site where a sensor detects heat and movement triggering the camera to take a series of photos.

In additional to learning about presence of a species at a site, you often observe interactions between individuals as they go about their nightly business.

Gippsland High Country Tours often uses remote cameras as part of wildlife research projects to gather data with as little impact on animals as possible. If conditions are right, remote cameras will be set as part of the Easter survey in Snowy River National Park (April 7-9).



Shells & Seashore Life of East Gippsland (March 29-April 2)

This trip is more than just a coastal holiday, it has a strong focus on learning about the coastal and marine environments and the creatures that live along Victoria's eastern seashores. Jenny will be joined by Alan Monger who brings years of expertise on shells in particular, but has held a deep interest in all marine life for more than 50 years.

Alan will enthusiastically lead you to discover the vast array of life that can be found on our seashores. You'll be wandering along the beaches beach-combing and getting up early while the tide is low to enjoy rock pool rambles. As we go along, Alan will record his findings to report back to the Museum of Victoria and the Marine Research Group.

You will learn the difference between different groups of organisms and gain an understanding of how they fit into the overall scheme of things and why protection of our marine environments and shorelines is so important.

In addition to time actively searching, there will be a few informal "tutorial" sessions and of course some free time too so you can relax and enjoy your surroundings.

Expect this trip to be more educational and research based, however you do not need any prior knowledge or experience. I do ask that you come along with a healthy curiosity about the natural world along our coasts and be open to learning more about the many forms of life we might find.

Walks are not long or difficult, but include some scrambling around rocks, so a reasonable level of fitness and agility will be required to participate fully.

Simple steps to reduce the impact of your paper trail

As we strive to reduce our environmental footprint we are constantly reminded to reduce printed material and in this age of email and electronic media this is often possible. However for many reasons printing remains a feature of modern life.

Finding ways to make printed material more environmentally friendly is important. Recycling is becoming a way of life. Reduce, re-use, recycle. Begin with reducing your printed material where possible and print double sided to reduce paper use. Then re-use what you can. Paper that has been printed on one side only (letters, old reports and office documents) can be used in home printers, or cut up and stapled for shopping lists, phone notepads etc... Finally recycle all paper thoughtfully.

When printing material yourself at home or in your workplace, community group or volunteer organization, look at reducing the impacts of your printing. Select paper carefully, around 85% of timber logged from Victoria's native forests ends up as pulp and paper. Recycled paper that uses 100% post consumer waste are gradually becoming more readily available. If its not recycled post consumer waste it is not actually reducing the amount of virgin pulp required and thus the number of trees cut down. Choosing 100% post consumer waste recycled paper over 100% virgin wood pulp paper means you use no trees, 63% less energy, 58% less water and produce 56% less greenhouse gases for every tonne of paper. Don't be fooled by claims that "recycled paper fouls photocopiers and printing machines". The quality of recycled paper has come a long way and this excuse is often used to avoid the slightly higher price of 100% post consumer waste recycled paper.
